

# Greetings to all,

In the gospel reading this Sunday, Jesus contrasts the attitude of the religious leaders of his day who wanted and expected to receive various forms of honour with what should be the attitude of his own disciples. namely the readiness and willingness to serve others. As Jesus says towards the end of that reading, 'the greatest among you must be your servant'.



Jesus defines greatness in terms of service of others. Rather than looking for honours from others, Jesus puts before us the ideal of honouring others by serving them.

It is those who humble themselves in the service of others who will be exalted, whereas those who exalt themselves and look for honour for themselves will be humbled.

Jesus clearly instructs his disciples that their role is to serve the people – not to be served. They are to follow the Jewish laws and customs as the Pharisees taught, but they were not to follow the Pharisees' example. Jesus hoped that his disciples would be humble in the best sense of the word.

Jesus demonstrated his teaching in his own life. Paul says of Jesus that he emptied himself taking the form of a servant and that he humbled himself, even to the point of death, death on a cross.

We also are the beloved of God, and as the beloved of God, we also need to live by God's law of love. We are to care for our neighbor and all people who are in need (even if we may not like them). Today is a good day for us to aware of our personal motivations! Why do we do what we do? Is it so others will think highly of us? Is it because we simply care about people and desire to help them as best we can?

Service is a great gift to give others. I suspect that most of the time our service consists of small daily tasks or actions. However, in this process, perhaps the true aift is noticing another's need and then reaching out to serve in a loving way! Blessings,

# LITURGY NOTES: UNDERSTANDING OF THE EUCHARISTIC CELEBRATION



**PREPARATION OF THE GIFTS** 

The Liturgy of the Word at Mass is followed by what is called the 'Preparation of the Gifts'. In the Preparation of the Gifts, the bread and wine for the Eucharist are brought forward, placed on the altar and a prayer said over them. The procession with the gifts by members of the assembly represents our participation in the eucharistic action as we offer ourselves along with the gifts of bread and wine.

The Missal's General Instruction mentions only bread, wine and money (or other gifts for the poor and the Church) in the procession. It is a procession of gifts: you can't take them back again afterwards!

In the early years of Christianity, the faithful brought bread and wine with them to church to be used in the celebration of the Eucharist. What wasn't used at the Mass was given to the poor and needy. Later, people started bringing other gifts of food or money which were offered for the work of the Church. In most parishes today a collection of money that will be used in the mission of the Church is taken up during the Preparation of Gifts. (TO BE CONTINUE...)

# THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER



Central to the Liturgy of the Eucharist at Mass is the Eucharistic Prayer. The priest offers this prayer on our behalf and we participate through the opening dialogue and the three acclamations, and by joining our personal praise and sacrifice to that of the Church. The following elements are included in all thirteen Eucharistic Prayers in the Missal, though the order varies:

**Thanksgiving -** especially in the Preface which gives thanks for the whole work of salvation or for some special aspect of it;

**Acclamation -** the "Holy, holy" sung by the people and presider after the Preface. Here we join the singing of the angels and saints before God's throne;

Relocating Parish Office Project update: The renovation and converting of the presbytery into a parish office has commence its work on the 2nd of November 2023. **Invocation -** or epiclesis, the calling down of the Holy Spirit on the gifts of bread and wine;

Institution narrative - the retelling of the scriptural account of Christ's words and actions at the Last Supper:

**Memorial prayer -** or anamnesis ('lest we forget') which recalls the paschal mystery;

**Offering -** the entire Church and this assembly offer Christ and themselves to God in union with Christ;

**Second invocation** of the Spirit - this time on those gathered that they may become "one body, one spirit in Christ";

**Intercessions** for the Church and the world, for the living and the dead;

**Final doxology -** ("through him, with him, ...."), the prayer of praise in which the celebrant sums up and concludes the thanksgiving offered to God.
