# Greetings to all,

I have to say that I love the Gospel reading of this Sunday, because it is full of imagines. Firstly, we see the wonderful image of people bring Jesus to Simon Peter's mother-inlaw who was in bed with a fever, in Capernaum. Secondly, the image of people bring all who were sick in Capernaum to Jesus.

what striking in these images is that in both cases people mediated between Jesus and those who needed him. We can see in that an image of our own calling to bring Jesus to others and to bring others to Jesus. The Lord looks to all of us to mediate between himself and others. If the Lord is to get his work done, he needs all of us.

At the end, we have another image which is an interesting interaction between Jesus and his disciples, early morning of the following day, Jesus went to a lonely place to pray, Simon Peter and his companions went out in search of him and when they found him they rebuked him saying. 'Everyone is looking for you', they said. these words seem to imply that, 'What are you wasting your time on your own when there are so many needy people in Capernaum looking for you' Yet, on this occasion, Jesus refused to go with them, because he had other places to visit, 'Let us go elsewhere', he said.

Yes, people could bring Jesus to others and bring others to Jesus, but they were not in control of him. Jesus was subject only to his heavenly Father, and his disciples had to learn to submit to him, to go after him, rather than insisting that he go after them.

I think this too is an important part of our calling. We need to yield to what the Lord wants to do and is doing; we are not in control or in charge of the Lord's work. Rather

we try to allow the Lord to do his work in and through us. It remains his work rather than ours. It is above all in prayer that we attend to the Lord of the work, so that we can do the work of the Lord.

# **ASH WEDNESDAY**

Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> February is Ash Wednesday, the first day of the season of Lent. It is designated by the Church as days of fast and abstinence, as is Good Friday.

In current Catholic practice, fasting means having only one full meal a day. Smaller quantities of food may be eaten at two other meals but no food should be consumed at any other time during the day. The law of fasting applies to people from 18 to 59 years old.

Abstinence is the practice of abstaining from the use of certain kinds of food. Everyone aged 14 years and older is bound by the law of abstinence from meat.

The practice of fasting and abstinence aims at leading us to interior conversion by making us more disciplined and more charitable. We fast in order to share our time and our treasure with an attitude of love towards God and others. In addition, the practice helps us imitate the example of Jesus who fasted for 40 days in the desert.

The ashes that are marked on our foreheads on the first day of Lent are a symbol of humility, purification and sorrow and remind us of the need to repent our failings. - *Elizabeth Harrington* 

**Ashes:** In the Jewish scriptures, ashes often suggest humility and human insignificance, as in the familiar "ashes to ashes, dust to dust". Ashes were also used as a purification offering to ritually cleanse the unclean and also to express mourning and sorrow. We continue the Jewish understanding of ashes as a symbol of humility, purification and sorrow when we are marked with ashes on the first day of Lent as a sign of our willingness to cleanse our heart through prayer, fasting and self-denial.

# **Cross:**

The cross is the primary symbol of Christianity and a central object in Catholic liturgy. The cross represents victory over death and salvation from sin. During Lent the cross leads the procession on Palm Sunday, is the focus of Stations of the Cross, and is venerated on Good Friday.

# Purple

Purple or violet is the prescribed liturgical colour for Lent. Purple is associated with mourning and so anticipates the pain and suffering of the crucifixion. Because it is the royal colour, it also celebrates Christ's resurrection and sovereignty. Purple vestments and hangings in Lent visually evoke a mood of simplicity and austerity, so added symbols are unnecessary and distracting. The colour is the symbol. - *Elizabeth Harrington*


